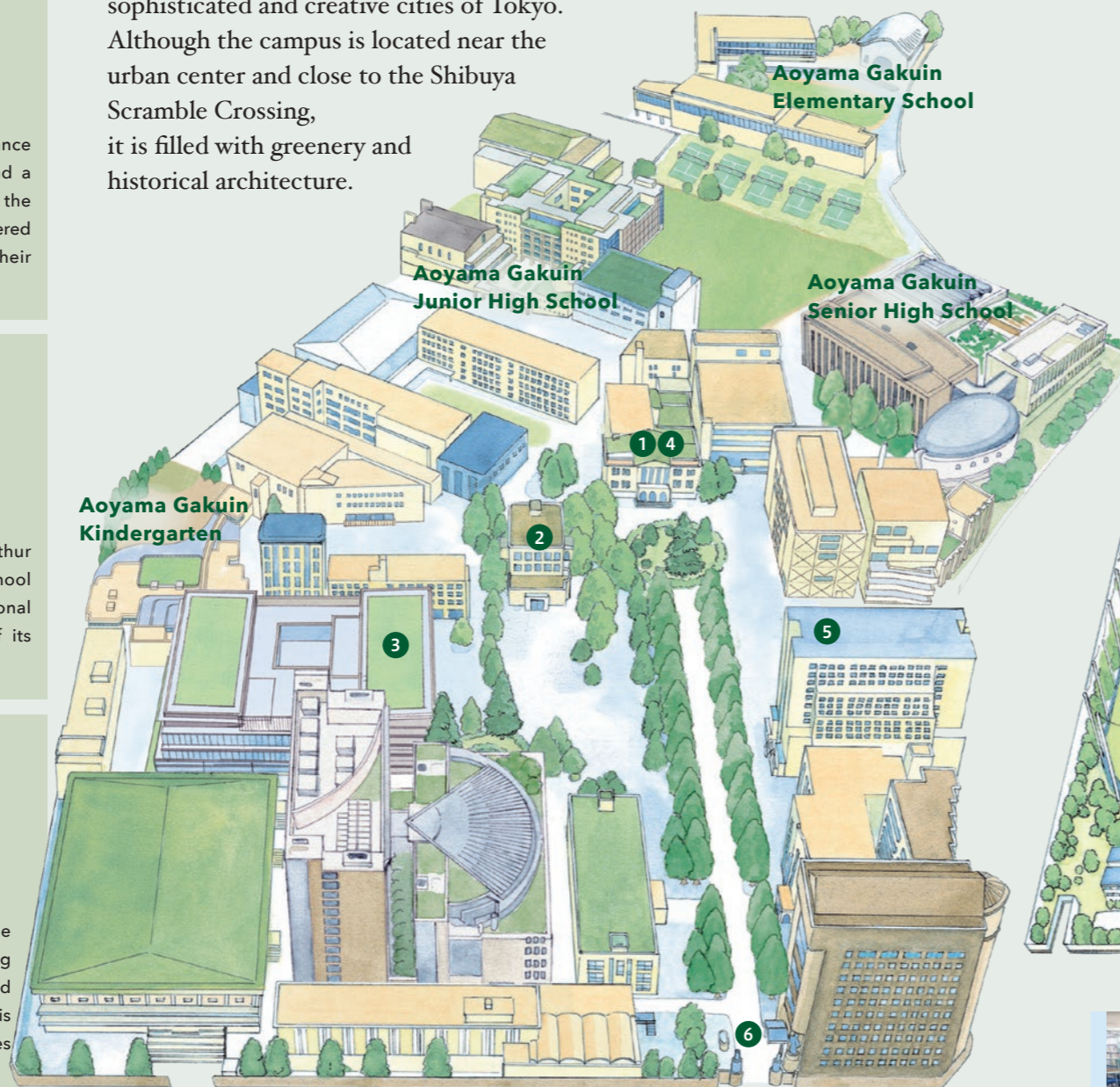


# Aoyama Campus

The Shibuya-Aoyama area is one of the most sophisticated and creative cities of Tokyo. Although the campus is located near the urban center and close to the Shibuya Scramble Crossing, it is filled with greenery and historical architecture.



**Majima Memorial Hall**

Majima Memorial Hall has Neo-Renaissance style architecture with Corinthian columns and a pediment at the front. Otohiko Majima, head of the alumni association at that time, and his wife offered to donate funds for the construction and their dream was fulfilled in 1929.



**Berry Hall**

Berry Hall was built in 1931. It is named after Arthur D. Berry, former dean of the Theological School of AGU. In 2008, it was registered as a national important cultural property in recognition of its Neo-Gothic style and beautiful chapel.



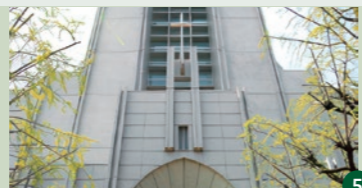
**The Maclay Memorial Hall**

The Maclay Memorial Hall is a cutting-edge academic facility opened in 2024. Integrating the Main Library, Institute of Information and Media, and Academic Writing Center, this building accommodates diverse learning styles and needs.



**Aoyama Gakuin Museum**

The Aoyama Gakuin Museum opened in May 2025 as part of the Aoyama Gakuin 150<sup>th</sup> anniversary commemorative project. The Museum houses a diverse collection of historical materials, including documents related to the history of Aoyama Gakuin, the development of Christianity in Japan from the early modern period to the modern era, rare Christian publications from the Meiji period.



**Goucher Memorial Hall**

Goucher Memorial Hall was built in 2001 to commemorate John F. Goucher, a missionary who supported Aoyama Gakuin. The university chapel is built in the 1st and 2nd floor.

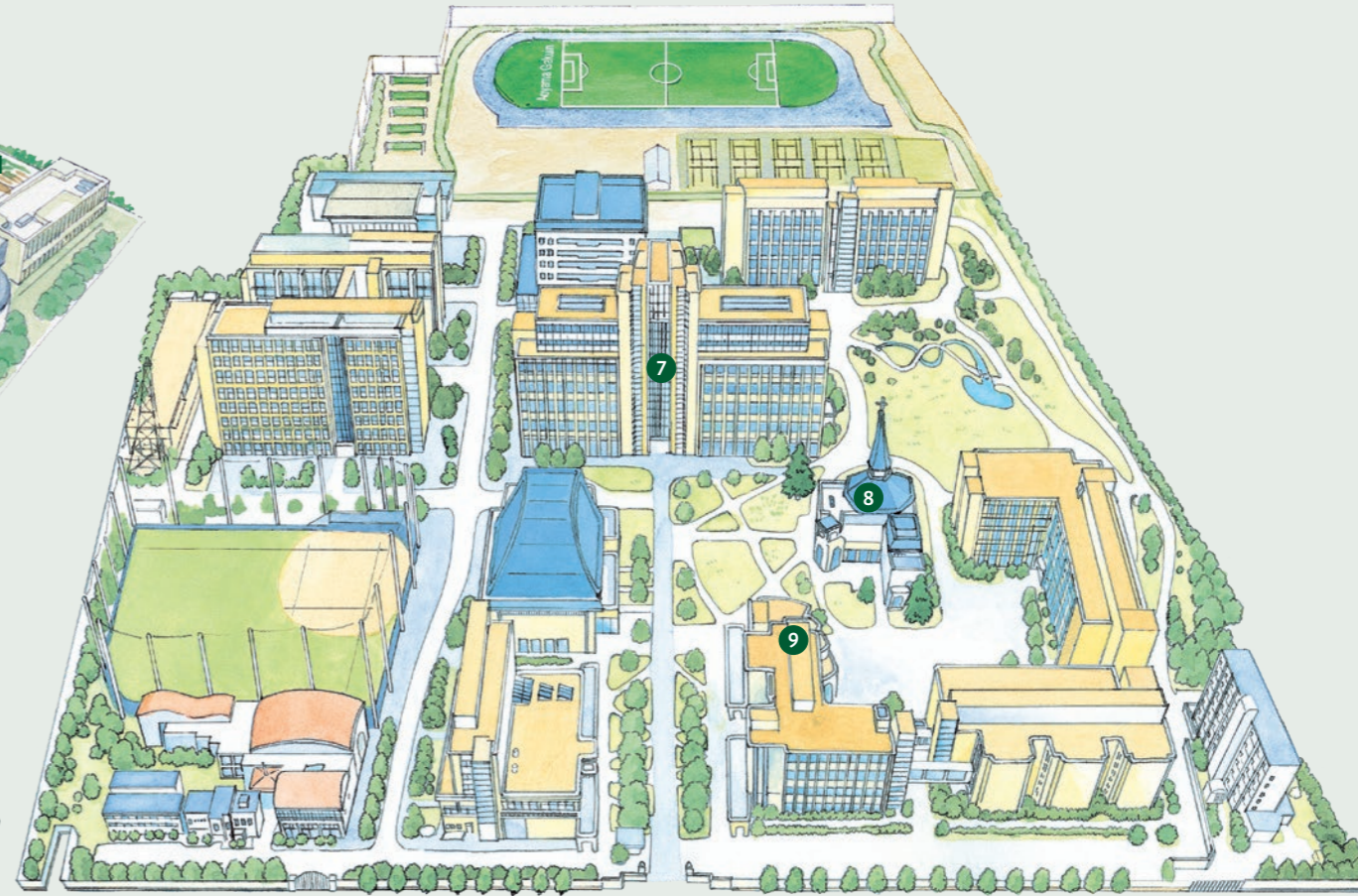


**The Main Street lined with Ginkgo Trees**

This tree-lined avenue extends straight from the main gate to the center of Aoyama Campus. The ginkgo trees changing their appearances by seasons and the historical architecture located along the main street provide a unique and irreplaceable imagery for all our alumni.

# Sagamihara Campus

Located in Sagami City in Kanagawa Prefecture, Sagami Campus is a short train ride away from the center of Tokyo. The spacious campus is proud of its beautiful landscape, and its state-of-the-art buildings are in harmony with nature.



**Mandai Memorial Library**

Located on the first through third floors of Building B, the library offers spacious reading areas on each floor in a calm and relaxing atmosphere. A variety of services are available, including audiovisual materials and group study spaces.



**Wesley Chapel**

Named after the Wesley brothers, who founded the Methodist movement, Wesley Chapel hosts daily worship services during the academic year. Its organ, with 2,817 pipes, fills the chapel with beautiful music.



**Building F, 1st Floor Lounge**

The largest lounge on campus is an open space where students can relax and socialize. Bright, spacious glass windows offer views of the chapel and the Media Center, making it a popular place for students to gather.
